Curriculum Overview

This will be achieved through a wide range of activities appropriate to each grade level, including singing, playing a variety of instruments, reading music, composing, dancing, creating, and listening/responding, among other activities. Assessment

Assessment takes place on a daily basis and is a key part of the learning/teaching process. Ongoing assessment of student learning informs students about what they have learned and what they have not yet learned.

Students will be provided with a variety of opportunities and ways to demonstrate their learning and understanding in relation to the curriculum (learning outcomes) for the subject/course. Student learning will be assessed using:

- Conversations with students
- Observations of learning
- Products students create to show their learning throughout the process

Students will be assessed continuously during class, based on their participation and growth in weekly music activities.

Assessments may be in the form of a comment, a checklist, or a rubric. The rubric uses Achievement Levels 1-4, as shown below:

4	In-depth knowledge and understanding of content and concepts. Able to extend the application of related skills.
3	Competent knowledge and understanding of content and concepts. Appropriate application of the related skills.
2	Developing knowledge and understanding of content and concepts. Developing in the application of the related skills.
1	Limited knowledge and understanding of content and concepts. Limited application of related skills.

Reports will use comments, as well as the following reporting codes:

WD = Well Developed

DE = Developing as Expected (for this age and stage of development)

ND = Needs Development

INS = Insufficient Evidence
